

JGS Pure Seed Project Report 1/7/08

As we reach into a new year it seems an appropriate time to look backward at last year and forward for a report on our Pure Seed Project. 2007 was a productive year for growing and harvesting our next generation gourds. Gourds that are a step toward the goal of IGS to provide more quality seed of varieties with assured trueness to type.

By the cooperative efforts of members and volunteers over 20 varieties of select gourds were advanced another generation by being grown in isolation or being selfed using hand pollinations. Those gourds were collected and stored under non -freezing conditions then graded and sorted for the best of type and quality. Some, not all yet, of these selected gourds have been opened and had seed extracted, washed, graded for quality, dried, labeled as individual lots and put in moisture resistant containers. In all ,so far, over 13,500 seeds came from 39 harvested gourds representing 16 varieties.

Seed from each individual gourd is undergoing germination testing. A full set of results is still pending but expected soon.

Seed stock will be kept from each harvested gourd for producing a future generation and as back up. Excess seed from 3rd or greater generation gourds reproducing true types that test well will be available for IGS regular seed sales in 08.

It is good to have this project showing the potential it is upon reaching the mid years of what will be a 7 year effort required to meet our "Pure Seed" requirements and certification.

As this program continues further we fully anticipate it will grow in size and value to IGS and seed customers. It will additionally involve more effort and increasing need for help. In December our IGS director, Ida Kennedy, and her uncle Ed Minarik came to work for a day with seed harvest and drying. Their help contributed in a big way. Both were also involved with growing some of the gourds we worked on.



Trellises: Cheap, Fast, and Easy

Note: We have round and oval raised beds.

Our first trellis experience was lashing water shoots from the apple tree together into tripods and then lashing on crossbars. The only expense was a bit of string for tying. These lasted about seven years, even with standing out in the rain all winter. They did need to be retied once or twice because we used cotton string.

Our second experience was of bolting two 2 x 4s together a few inches from the ends, making an "X" with long legs. We straddled two of them over the ends of an old clothes line pole in our yard around which we made a large raised bed.

We screwed in "L" hooks about 12" apart down the length of the 2 x 4s, laid bamboo poles in the "L" hooks, then laid additional poles across the ends of the first poles at right angles (the side poles support the end poles and make a square,) then lashed them together with twist ties.

Cost was the cost of the four 2 x 4s, a few "L" hooks, two bolts, washers, and the bamboo poles, some of which were obtained for free from a bamboo grower's compost pile. The bamboo doesn't weather particularly well, so we bring these poles indoors. We sometimes fold down the 2 x 4s and bring them in also.

Regnirements for Accessing the 2008 JGS Show

What is required to get into the 2008 IGS Show?

And, of course, a good map to find the fairgrounds and the buildings we will be in (see prior issues).

If you are placing items into competition you will need a ticket to get into the grounds to do so.

If you are volunteering at the show you will need a show pass to get into the grounds. You need to Volunteer EARLY to get your pass. We really want and need our volunteers, however, if you wait too long we may not be able to supply the pass as the volunteers require Pre-Show Registration. Register at the latest two weeks PRIOR to the start of the show.

If your are attending Workshops you WILL need a ticket to get into the grounds. The ticket is NOT included in the price of your Workshop.

If you are a Vendor you will need your Gate Pass to access the Fairgrounds, otherwise you will have to purchase a Ticket!

Tickets and gate passes will be sold (\$5.00 for all three days) and/or identified just off of the main roadway into the Fairgrounds far from the buildings.

PACKAGJNG TJME AGAJN

I have reserved the room at the Thorntown Library again this year for our Seed Packaging Day on ?????? (I've asked for March 1, 2008).

As many of you know, during the past year, there has been a LOT of activity about what we are going to do and where we are headed with seeds.

We will be eliminating 10 varieties from the box this year, so we may have to either re-label those or print other information on the packages. The varieties eliminated were the "mixes", those that were "duplicates" of other varieties or of inferior quality, and those that were at the bottom of the list in sales over the last three years.

Steve Sullivan took on the task of Germination Studies of those seeds we already had in the Seed Box to assure that all are germinating properly. The results of the studies MAY require marking the correct germination rate on all packages of some varieties. Although we haven't purchased as many seeds as in prior years we will be packaging about the same quantity with the seeds coming from the Pure Seed Project efforts.

We will also be figuring out what to do with our existing packages of PSP seeds as well. Some of those may need relabeled to fold over into our Seed Box.

The white plastic boxes you have seen at past festivals will either disappear or will contain seed "sale specials" of the varieties being eliminated from the Seed Box.

We need to get as much of this done during the packaging day as I also have to update the two books we have for our customers to view.

SO, as usual, WE NEED VOLUNTEERS!! Your help is requested and greatly appreciated in the packaging effort. I could not get this done by myself until about State Fair time, or later. And, it is a great time to get together or reacquainted with all of your gourdhead friends again.

Gourd Pests

On how to control gourd pests, Dallas Lunsford reviewed back issues and this article was copied from *The Tendril*, Vol 2 No 2, Page 1 It was written by Ron Bair

Just a short note for this growing season. For those pesky little stripped and spotted cucumber beetles that seem to invade us all - Liquid Sevin does wonders! But be careful! Spray about 1 to 1 1/2 hours before dark AFTER THE HONEYBEES HAVE QUIT VISITING. DO NOT SPRAY IN THE HEAT OF THE DAY and if you don't have a very big bee population visiting your blossoms, you may want to leave a few of the pesky cucumber beetles for pollination purposes

GROWING. CURING. CLEANING AND CRAFTING GOURDS By Jim Story

WHY GROW GOURDS

Gourds are one of the world's most versatile plants. The many shapes and sizes of the fruits, lightness when cured (dried), their lasting qualities, and the many utilitarian purposes make the gourd a favorite of gardeners and craftsmen worldwide. Dried gourds have been made into bowls, storage containers, dippers, birdhouses, vases, pitchers, dolls, musical instruments (gourds are excellent resonators), lamps, jewelry, birds, animals, reptiles, insects, wreaths, wall hangings, Christmas ornaments, contrived flowers, caricatures and even cathouses. Gourds are excellent material for fall decorations and are attractive and in demand in creative floral designs. They are popular sale items at ways and means tables.

GOURD CULTURE

There are two species of gourds: cucurbita pepo, the colorful, yellow flowered ornamental; and the Lagenaria siceraria, the white flowered hard shell kind. Lagenaria require a long growing season (130 frost free days) to fully mature. It is important to get them started early so plant as soon as possible after the danger of frost has passed. Seeds can be started inside about 35 days before the last frost. Too early will let the plants get leggy and difficult to transplant. Harden off plants before planting where they will grow. Ornamental gourd seeds can be planted (direct seeded) in the garden after danger of frost has passed.

Gourd culture is similar to that of pumpkins, cucumbers and squash. Plant in full sun and allow plenty of room for the vines that sometimes grow to a length of 30 or more feet. Gourds may be grown on the ground, but it is preferable to grow tl'1em on a fence or trellis. Hand pollinate lagenarias to increase yield. Both kinds can be grown in molds to obtain unusual shapes. Use 1/4" or thicker plexiglass to make molds. Wood and plaster forms may be used but I prefer translucent (clear) molds.

CURING GOURDS

Both the ornamentals and hardshell gourds can be cured outside. Winter weather will not damage the shells of fully mature gourds and the freezing and thawing makes the skin easier to remove. To save seed, the gourd must be brought inside to dry. Put small gourds in a mesh bag and drape over a fence or tree limb. Shake the bag every three or four weeks. cure large gourds off the ground where they will get good air circulation. No matter how moldy it looks, it is good. The shell below the mold will be a beautiful tan. Immature gourds will shrivel during the curing process and should be discarded.

CLEANING GOURDS

To bring out the beauty of gourds and to prepare them for crafting, they must be cleaned. This means removing the outside skin and mold. Soak gourds in warm water until the outside skin becomes soft, then remove the skin with a steel scouring pad and/or knife. Some folks use soapy water to clean gourds, but just plain water will do. When the cleaned gourds are dry, they are ready for crafting.

CRAFTING GOURDS

Craftsmen are limited only by their imagination as to the things that can be made from gourds. Gourds can be sawed, drilled, etched, burned (wood burning tool, dyed, painted, stained and varnished. mature gourds are light and durable, making them an excellent medium for all sorts of crafting ideas. Creative people love gourds.

GOURD KNOWLEDGE may be obtained by: (1) attending a gourd show; (2) joining the Indiana and American Gourd societies; (3) gourd books; and/or (4) visiting a gourd grower.
