

President's Message

Celebrate it—we are engaging in missional discontinuity, my favorite pastime: doing several things at once. We are combating dementia and supporting IGS at the same time. Don't you love a win-win opportunity?

The IGS Spring/Membership Meeting was held May 3, 2008 at the Miami Co. Fairgrounds. President, Sid Meyers opened the meeting at 2:40 pm.

There was no Secretary's report as the minutes were not available. Phil Moorhead, Treasurer, reported \$26,161.14 in the savings account and \$9,956.97 in the checking account for a total of \$36,118.11. The books balance with the bank statements. The report will be filed for audit.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Ways and Means Loretta Pressel reported that Ways and Means did very well at the State Show with sales of \$1,200.00. Today's receipts are \$112.75. We are out of some sizes and more shirts need to be ordered. Phil related that we now have the copyrites to the Jim Story tapes. We can now make DVD'S. It was mentioned that the date the program was taped needs to be noted somewhere on the VCR tapes and DVD'S. Phil is going to work with Don Kelver on acquiring the DVD's.

Publicity Renee Meyers says that she feels that the best way of communicating our IGS news of events is through, Newspapers, Posters and Word of Mouth. She is to get the radio tape interview, done for the State Show, for the Web site.

Web Master Phil stated that the Membership area is still open for use without a password. But, try using your password. You must have Adobe Reader to get the Tendril.

Show Chair Renee feels the State Show was a rousing success. Next year's show is scheduled for March 27, 28 and 29. We will be using the Jackson Street entrance, and the ticket booth sales will be handled differently. Attendances for the classes were double from last year. The Education material given out was up from last year. The evening dinner was well attended with 80 in attendance. Renee felt we had good coverage from the South Bend Tribune and the Elkhart Truth as well as the TV station.

It was felt by Renee and other members that, THE EXCITEMENT IS BACK. Renee felt doing numerous announcements helped keep the excitement going and that the wearing of the Red Vests helped as well. Renee has volunteered to chair the 2009 State Show with Alice Pawlowski as co-chair. They are taking ideas for next year's show theme.

Education Ray Nixon reported that he does not have the total from the State Show finalized yet. He noted that several new articles are being developed.

Fall Meeting Guy Shutt reported that the Fall Meeting is Nov. 8 at the Tippecanoe Fairgrounds in Lafayette.

State Fair Phil and Jesse asked for volunteers to help set-up on August 3 at 9:00 am. They also need help to man the booth and to do demonstrations. The Fair is August 6-17, 2008. If you want to exhibit, the forms can be found on the Indiana State Fair web site. We are on alert that the State Fair will be expanding their time frame from 12 days to 17 days. 2009 dates are August 7-23. MORE people will be needed to handle these extra days.

Seeds Jesse reported that \$1,000.00 was made at the State Show. Today, the receipts were \$114.00. Jesse pulled 1,300 packages of seeds from his inventory due to Steve Sullivan's germination studies. He may have to order more for the State Fair.

Membership Dallas Lunsford reported that at the State Show we welcomed 14 new members' and 30 renewals. To-day we welcomed 1 new member and 1 renewal. As of May 3 we have 361 paid members.

Tendril Editor The next deadline for the Tendril is May 15.

Patch Leaders Renee reported that Patch 1 is having a Gourd Festival on May 24 at the LaPorte County Fairgrounds, in the rabbit building. Robbie Hiduke is in charge of the vendors and Sherry Benedict is in charge of the demonstrations. There will be an auction and food will be available. The times are 9:00 am to 3:00 pm CST.

Sid talked about Patches and their guidelines. We have three approved patches. One, Patch 1, in the top half of the state, one in Johnson Co. in the Delphi area and a new one in the Corydon area near Evansville.

Approval of budget The budget total for 2008/2009 is \$34,950.00. Projected income is \$40,190.00. Membership-\$500.00, State Show-\$22,500.00, State Fair-\$800

Operations - \$2,100.00, Photography- \$100.00, Pure Seeds- \$150.00.

Steve Sullivan made a motion that we accept the 2008/2009 budget. Joyce Dankowski 2nd the motion. Motion carried.

It was noted that the auction, today, netted \$378.00.

Pure Seeds Steve Sullivan reported that we are now able to sell seeds from our Pure Seed program. Jesse will not have to purchase as many seeds as we can now sell our own seeds.

Comments from Steve: Steve feels that the Miami Co. fair grounds building is a good facility. He wants to thank the vendors, and the members who made the effort to attend. There was not much of a crowd but there was a lot of enthusiasm. It was noted that the attendance for the Spring Meeting for the last three years has been low. The board thanked Steve for his efforts.

Nominations and election of officers

The ballots of nominees for next year were passed out to the membership. The voters were directed to change Bill Freihofer to 2nd vice president and enter Sid Meyers for 1st vice president. Phil Moorhead, treasurer, was to be crossed out. He is not up for re-election this year. The official ballot read:

Guy Shutt, Jesse Glessner *Recording Secretary* Loretta Pressel *Membership Secretary* Pat Moore. The ballots were collected and tallied by Renee Meyers, Robbie Hiduke and Blanch Murrin.

President's report: My four years, as President, has not always been easy. But, I feel they have been rewarding. I have experienced many situations. I find especially rewarding during my four years the dramatic changes that have occurred. I feel it is now time to step back and let some one else take us to the next level. I feel that the IGS is ready to turn the corner and to start achieving new growth. It is time for new leadership.

New people have stepped forward and accepted responsibility. We have successfully completed Patch reorganization. We now have an electronic newsletter. We are the last state to go this route. The electronic newsletter saves a great deal of money. We now have Education material online. We needed to make a change in the location of our State Show. We decided on South Bend and it appears to be a good move. We now have a money system that is infallible. All income and spending is accounted for. I am happy to announce that for the 1st time in several years we are operating in the black. We operated in the "Red" for several years previous. Our being able to sell our own seeds has helped with lowering our expenses. The society is ever grateful to Steve Sullivan for the Pure Seed Program. All these changes have been very significant, and can only make for a stronger society.

It was suggested that since the postage rates were going up, that we purchase a large quantity of postage stamps. Bill Freihofer made a motion that we do not purchase any stamps. Phil Moorhead 2nd. Motion carried.

Steve Sullivan made a motion that we adjourn. Joyce Dankowski 2nd. Approved The membership meeting concluded at 4:00 pm

Cucurbit Insect Management

Purdue Dept of Entomology Bulletin E-30, Vegetable Insects" is a good source of information if you have insect problems in your gourds. Single copies can be obtained from your local extension office.

The striped cucumber overwinters in Indiana and is the 1st concern we generally face each spring with seedlings. The spotted beetle is the "Western Corn rootworm" pest noted in June to August. Both of these beetles transmit "Bacterial Wilt". This is the case of the sudden, severe, and permanent wilt of a single plant runner or the entire plant. Squash bugs are brownish-black, about 5/8ths of an inch long. We see them largely on the gourd fruit later in the season in large numbers. These bugs love butternut squash and will move from squash to gourds easily.

Sevin is recommended for Beetle control. "Ambush/Pounce" or Asana is suggested for squash bug control. There is no cure known for "Bacterial Wilt". Control of the insects is needed to control the wilt.

What about those pesky pests – Cucumber beetles (spotted & striped), Squash vine borer, and Squash bugs.

For the Organic Grower - I have read that Sabadilla Dust or Spray works very well to get rid of Cucumber beetles and Adult Squash bugs. For the Squash bug nymph and Squash vine borer, 5% Rotenone Dust or Spray is supposed to be very effective.

For the Non-Organic Grower - Sevin Dust or Spray works well to get rid of Cucumber beetles and Squash bugs.

All three of these Dusts or Sprays have a wide variety of uses for other vegetables, ornamentals, shrubs, and vines. Be sure to READ THE LABEL. Sprays seem to be more economical. NOTE - When applying any of these dusts or sprays, try to apply at dusk after the bees have left and gone home for the evening. Try to apply before the dew sets in, so that it will have time to dry. Do not apply dusts or sprays when the vegetation is wet. Sevin spray is known to cause a whitish discolor to the leaves. This doesn't seem to harm. Some types of moths visit in the evening and help in pollination.

One method I have used to kill the Squash vine borer, is to cover the vine where the borer appears to be. Cover the vine with good loose soil on top of the damaged area, and pat it down firmly, making a 6" to 8" mound of soil. This will usually smother the borer. Keep watered well. The vine will normally take new roots and continue to grow.

For those growing on a trellis, this is impossible. For these vines, a J-Hook can be made from small wire. Slide the J-Hook up inside the vine and extract the borer. Keep this portion of the vine watered down from time to time over the next couple days. The presence of the borer can be noted by a secreted pile of sawdust looking material near their hole. There are also methods of injection to get rid of the borer.

The Cucumber beetle thrives on the blooms. It will also eat on the gourds. They are beneficial at the same time though. They do an extremely large amount of pollination. In some cases, they may be the
