Growing Larger Gourds

Try to get the best seeds to start with. Genetics makes a world of difference.

Harry Hurley and a Kentucky gourd grower have grown very large bushels and they were very thick. IGS and others sell some very good bushel seeds as Bushel 100 + .

To make your gourds larger, you will need more growing days. Start by planting the seeds indoors.

When ready to transplant, you can plant where you have mixed manure with soil.

Cut the bottom off a 5 gallon bucket and set over your plant if

it is too cold or chance of frost.

Spread black covering around plant if it is too cold and this will draw heat to help your plant to grow.

I used to dig a hole about 10 inches from the root and pour rain water mixed with miracle grow in the hole.

I grew a 325 pound pumpkin doing this.

After nice weather comes, you can remove the bucket and black covering
