## **Drying And Harvesting Gourds**

Ornamental, soft-shelled gourds are ready to harvest when the tendril next to the gourd turns brown or the stems are dry and brown. Ornamentals are often picked prior to being fully mature and used for fall displays. If harvested early and not mature, these soft-shelled gourds may develop wrinkled skins and rot. When the gourds rattle [dry], you can paint or polish them with products used for finishing wood. Ornamental make excellent holiday ornaments or add interest to wreaths.

Hard-shell gourds require 110 to 150 days of warm weather to fully mature. They should be left on the vine as long as there is life in the vine. They must be cured. Since gourds are over 90% water, it may take several months for a large gourd to dehydrate. I wait till after hard frost in central Indiana to harvest my hard-shells.

Freezing temperatures do not hurt mature gourds. If the gourds wrinkle up, this indicates an immature gourd. One can leave gourds outside to dry or use an attic or garage. The outer skin will mold, rot, and began to peel as the gourd dries. DO NOT THROW AWAY THE MOLDY GOURD. After the fruit [gourd] has dried, scrape off the outer skin remaining to reveal the hard permanent shell below the grime. Soak dried gourds in water for a few minutes and wash/scrape. Use of a plastic scrubbing pad works for removing most of the mold. The mold patches may have discolored the shell but this can be painted over or use a clear finish to Enhance the appearance. Remember any wood finishing product can be used on a dried gourd.

## **Get Your Competition Gourds Started!**

To transfer a DETAILED pattern to a gourd you might try the following procedure. Reproduce the pattern on a copier. Now mark this copy as "FRONT". Next, turn the pattern over and trace the pattern on the back of the copy. Again, put this reverse design on the copier and reproduce that with 3-4 copies. Cut and tape one of these REVERSE patterns to your gourd. With a very large tip called a "shoe" inserted into your wood burner, burn the pattern onto your gourd much like using a small iron.

To make great parallel lines on your gourd place some putty on a small board that you can then set your gourd on to steady it. Make sure the plate isn't going to interfere with the pencil stand. Pull the pencil stand near and adjust the height. Place the pencil on the gourd and turn the gourd slowly, holding the pencil lightly. Re-adjust the height for the next line and continue. Try and make all of your parallel horizontal lines in one setting, if possible.

For great geometrical patterns purchase patterns at a stationery store and place those under plastic so you can trace them. Place masking tape on the plastic over the desired pattern and trace the pattern onto the tape. Gently pull the tape from the plastic and place precisely on the gourd. Gourds being cylindrical or spherical in shape, you may have to adjust the tape slightly. Lightly (at low temperature) burn the pattern through the tape. Now pull the tape and continue with your wood burning of the pattern.

Use GRAPHITE tracing paper under your pattern and trace directly onto the gourd. You may have to cut your paper to fold around the gourd.

Use material from a roll of GLAD – Press and Seal plastic sealer. Place the material over your pattern and trace over the pattern. Pull the plastic from the pattern and place on and around your gourd. This material is GREAT as it will stretch to the shape of the gourd. Make sure the material is well placed and pressed down. Lightly wood burn the pattern (on the lowest control setting) and pull all of the plastic back off of the gourd. You can now continue wood burning or use the pattern for painting, pen and ink, or any of a variety of crafting processes. 

## **Mother Of Pearl In Gourds**

If you happen to open a gourd that is filled with soft, fluffy, off-white "cotton," pull the fiber out gently with your hand. There will still be soft remnants clinging to an otherwise nice hard mother of pearl finish.

What to do? Very carefully scrape away the soft fibers, and underneath the dullness is hard shiny mother of pearl. In places, it may not be perfectly smooth. It may have been gouged or coming off in layers, still pretty, but a looking a bit fly-away and imperfect.

Mix one part Elmer's glue to two parts water, and paint the inside with a foam brush. Doing so will put a hard finish on the softer white parts, tacking them down so they are not prone to further damage. The glue mixture will dry clear and shiny just like the "good" mother of pearl with no discoloration, and now you have a true gem on your hands.

Note: I cut open about fourteen of these this year. I had seen the mother of pearl before on rare occasions but never a gourd filled with the soft cottony fiber.
