Sandlady's history - 'Fun with Gourds Presentation'

I started growing Gourds in the 1980's before I learned they had gourd societies. I was as mesmerized with the gourds as the people who purchased them from me. Ron and I would walk up and down the rows of gourds just enjoying the shapes and watching how fast they would grew. I remember the time, my friend Phyllis walking the fields with me and we would get on our knees loving the gourds and hugging them, especially those big bushels and Nigerian giants. With gourds, there is never a dull moment.

I noticed when I took my produce to farmers markets at Champaign and Urbana, IL that students would come and draw a picture of me and my stand. Why not, it had all those interesting shapes amongst the melons, squash, pumpkins, etc. My yard was full of these things. People were naturally drawn to them as I had been.

In the beginning, Ron didn't like my taking up space in the field for gourds amongst his melons. First year, I wanted one row, liked them so well, next year I took two rows and Ron didn't like that. Then I took about an acre, Ron really didn't like that, and then I took about two acres and Ron didn't really like that. Yet he did walk through there enjoying them with me. Then he later ended up in a wheel chair and I was taller than him and I quit growing the melons, pumpkins, and squash. A couple saw my sign for melons, pumpkins, squash and gourds. I sold them \$2500 worth of gourds. They showed us their art on gourds and was it beautiful. They decorated a tree with gourd Christmas ornaments in Washington, DC that represented Mississippi. From that day on, Ron became a gourd lover. Wonder why. Then I grew 12 acres the next year. And I started drawing covered bridges on gourds and made Santa ornaments too.

Finally a couple from Chicago shared a newsletter about the World's Greatest Gourd Show. I thought it was a cult centered around the gourds. A friend and I went to the 1988 Ohio Show. We loved it and I came home with the most beautiful pictures of what people do with gourds.

I have been invited many times to do presentations with gourds as my theme. I call it, 'Fun with Gourds'. I have been called to many organizations, clubs, schools, interviews for newspapers, magazines, PBS programs like Across Indiana, Friday Zone, and Weekly Special and many more. The largest group I have done is the Illinois Master Gardeners (350). I have presented at Turkey Run State park, Elder Hostels, Homemaker clubs, Women's Day at the Fair, Women's clubs in Terre Haute, IN and the fair there. Many, Many more. Then I have done a couple large presentations to large Churches NW of Indianapolis. Their group of about 100 each from a church of about 3000 was larger than the small country Church I attended. At most of these

Presentations, if there are men there, they might say their wife or friend pressed them to come. They told me they thought a Presentation about gourds with be boring. They changed their mind. That was when I began calling my presentation 'Fun with Gourds'.

I have never used notes or outlines. It is all in my mind. I start with some personal knowledge how I got started growing the gourds. I had purchased two boxes of seeds my nephew was selling for school. I bought all his seeds thinking he wouldn't ask anyone else. Those were ornamental gourds of all colors and shapes. Sold them all. Sold gourds in my Parke County Covered Bridge Festival Booth. I would tell them about how to plant and grow gourds. Tell them how to pollinate the gourds like the birds and bees do it. Tell them how to prune the vines back to about 10 feet long. Answer any question during my talk. There would be some interesting ones, like when to plant which is after the danger of frost is past. When to harvest which is after the last Jack Frost. What kind of weed killer do I use, which is Trust. And what kind of bug control is used being melithieum and liquid Sevin. Sometimes they would tell me of their experience with gourds growing up.

I took several pieces of finished gourd artwork with me for show and tell. I would tell of the different types of gourds and the different types techniques used in art on gourds. There was painting with acrylics, weaving, carving, sculpture, jewelry, and much more. Each time I closed a presentation, I show them about 20 pieces of gourd musical instruments, mostly made by Ralph Irish, of upper Illinois. I would ask that about 20 people come forward and make up a band just for fun. They could play like they did when they were kids. I ask for a song leader and they usually have one. They pick an easy song to play and have a great time. Then it is the end of the presentation.

I just did a Mother-daughter Banquet in Veedersburg, IN. Next I do a Women's Garden Club in Terre Haute. They always reimburse my expenses and give me a little extra which makes it

more fun. My next event is here at the Farm June 2 from 9 a.m. to 4 pm. Come and see my Gourd Art Museum and walk through a barn full of gourds. Free make it take it for everyone with help if needed.

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Tips On Planting To Sell A Field Of Gourds

Sandlady 'Helen Thomas' shares 'Tips on planting to selling a field of gourds". I live in Parke County, Indiana, zone 5 in Liberty Township. Here in Howard, In. (Tangier, In.). There are several acres of sandy soil. This soil is perfect for gourds, melons, pumpkins, squash, and vegetables.

I cultivate the 14 acre field and disk it down. I have the Co-op come out and spray dried fertilizer over the fields. I don't know the amount; but it would be close to 12-12-12. I tell them to look up whatever amounts you would need for melons, pumpkins, squash, and gourds. They go from there.

I save my own seeds for planting each crop. I like to open the gourds in the fall right after they are picked. I choose good shapes, thick walls, and take the seeds out and do not let the seeds freeze. I wash the seeds. I lay them on screens. I dry them for a week or two in the shop in front of a furnace, fan, and they don't touch floors or walls. Mold is dangerous, so in taking seeds from green gourds, I can get the green shells outside.

It started raining and it seemed like it rained a month. It takes at least 90 days to grow small gourds and 90 to 150 days to grow larger gourds. Plant after last frost and harvest after frost.

Next I put Trust, a weed killer, in my tank, and added water according to directions. Sprayed fields and then very lightly disk it in. I only let mine lay a couple of days before planting.

It started raining and it was getting late when I finally planted the gourds. Every seed came up. They were robust in growing. About every week or two, if needed, I cultivated. I sprayed liquid seven for bugs. I don't like to do that unless I need to.

I have a John Deere tractor and planter. The weather was good for a couple months. Then it turned off real hot. Seems like gourds enjoy 75 to 85 degree temps. The gourds seemed to be at a standstill. I was disappointed and so didn't go look at them again until frost hit them. Didn't think I would harvest many. Got a surprise. I harvested 20 loads off 10 acres of kettles, bushels, canteens, tobacco boxes, etc. I was really surprised at the quality and quantity of my bombers. Anything small 2"-5" that has a round bulb with a tip, or rounded top or neck, I call a bomber. The quality was excellent on this field. Quantity? We loaded 5 wagon loads off 4 acres. Using enough fertilizer sure makes a difference. I have found whenever I cheat on the amount of fertilizer, the quality goes down.

We had to clean up the gourd washer and put on new strainers to keep bits of sand out of the pipes. John started washing gourds Monday, March 5, 2012. Looking good. As John washes, I choose which ones we will load and take to the Indiana Gourd Show, April 12-15 at Greenfield, Indiana.

Then I lay out gourds we will use for free make it take it classes here at the farm when we have our gourd sale on June 1-3. After that, we will start putting the gourds on shelves in the barns and anyplace the light will not fade them. It gets funny when someone comes and they survey those piles of gourds and many shelves of gourds in the barn, they grinned real big and squeal, "I feel like I am in Gourd Haven'! I love it.
