

President's Message

IGS General Question

With snow on the ground and temperatures predicted to be below zero, it is a bit challenging to think of planting seeds and pulling weeds. However, one great thing about Indiana is that the weather will change. The Indiana Gourd Society annually plans events and takes part in garden and other shows to promote the gourdgeous gourd and to educate about their cultivation, use, history, and decoration.

Questions about gourds continue year 'round—and many that I receive are as a result of questions asked on our web site and redirected to me. I try to answer or to connect the query to someone who might help with an answer. There is probably one question per week, at least.

Not all questions are about gourds. For example, in November a question came about how to dry a whole pumpkin...because it had been autographed. Turns out that it is somewhat possible to dry them by scooping out pulp, bleaching, and stuffing with wadded newspaper that

is changed frequently. However, I still think the best plan is to take a great photo of the pumpkin and signature...just in case. I also thought that next year a gourd should be signed instead of a pumpkin; there is probably a better chance of successful drying! I may never hear of the results of that questioner's work, but it was an interesting investigation for me.

In January I received a picture from a man in Central Indiana who, three years ago, bought a carved gourd for \$5.00 at a flea market. He is wondering what the provenance might be and what the value of the gourd is. Our **Tendril** publisher will include a photo with this issue in the event that anyone can help with identification. Please let me know if you have a clue. I am sending to selected members, and, if we don't have anyone who might advise us on the story of this gourd, we can try some AGS members and some gourd authors who have travelled widely.

Often the questions are about what to do with moldy gourds. Many times the queries direct us to create

> an educational article that will help with similar questions. This is especially true with the question, "I bought a package of gourd seeds. Now what do I do?" Another recent question was, in September, "I have harvested half of my gourds, and the ones on the vine are starting to turn color or are starting to mold, what do I do?" I just hope that those harvested before frost will dry properly; my dogs knocked a martin house off the vine in July and it rotted nicely. Some years I have had rotting gourds dry to look like dried apple faces, but I never count on success when harvest is early.

Many times I redirect these questions to one of you readers if I think you have had experience related to the query. When you receive such an e-mail from me, I hope you will reply, even if it is just to say, "I have no experience with this issue." Part of our mission is education, and I appreciate everyone's help with this aspect of IGS.

Sugar Creek Gourd Patch—Karen Niemeyer

Eight members of the Sugar Creek Gourd Patch met at the Thorntown Public Library, 124 N. Market St., Thorntown, IN, on December 4 to work on basic chip carving on gourds as taught by Patch members Beth Morris and Monta Taylor. Both gourders had participated in a class taught in early May at the Indiana Gourd Show by James Bennett of Bradenton, Florida. They displayed their completed bird houses made from martin house gourds and talked participants through practice cuts. Leather dyes and gel stains were added for additional color. The Sugar Creek Gourd Patch meets every first and third Wednesday from 6-8 p.m. If no joint project is on the agenda, members work on individual projects. However, on December 18 the holes for bird houses will be cut and pine cone pieces will be affixed as roof shingles. Visitors and new members are invited, but should call Karen at the library 765-436-7348 to assure that adequate supplies will be on hand.

EDUCATION

Trellises: Cheap, Fast, and Easy Mary Gayle Van Ingen—Milwaukie, OR

Note: We have round and oval raised beds.

Our first trellis experience was lashing water shoots from the apple tree together into tripods and then lashing on crossbars. The only expense was a bit of string for tying. These lasted about seven years, even with standing out in the rain all winter. They did need to be retied once or twice because we used cotton string.

Our second experience was of bolting two 2 x 4s together a few inches from the ends, making an "X" with long legs. We straddled two of them over the ends of an old clothes line pole in our yard around which we made a large raised bed. We screwed in "L" hooks about 12" apart down the length of the 2 x 4s, laid bamboo poles in the "L" hooks, then laid additional poles across the ends of the first poles at right angles (the side poles support the end poles and make a square,) then lashed them together with twist ties. Cost was the cost of the four 2 x 4s, a few "L" hooks, two bolts, washers, and the bamboo poles, some of which were obtained for free from a bamboo grower's compost pile. The bamboo doesn't weather particularly well, so we bring these poles indoors. We sometimes fold down the 2 x 4s and bring them in also.

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Show Question

My question is concerning the **competition levels** (N, I, A, M). Do I have to enter all my pieces under one level? In a past year I won a "Best of Award" for one of my entries, do I have to move ALL of my entries into a higher level? Let's say I am fairly new at wood burning, and never got a blue ribbon as a novice in it, what level do I enter into?

Answer-1

For an example let's say you were at the Advanced level last year. You may enter your pieces in Advanced again this year. In the Classes you have won a "Best of" Award, you <u>must</u> move up one level into Masters. You may have entries in both A and M, but not in the same class. In other words, you might be A in class 34 and M in class 56.

Answer-2

If you are in Advanced this year, you may **REGRESS** one level for a Techniques or class/category you are new or less good at. So Intermediate level is also possible, say for wood burning. (This is really up to you, but you CAN NOT/SHOULD NOT go back to Novice. Your artistic talents and background are way above Novice level.) — Pat Moore

Show Question

Are stems required in the Jim Story Classes 14-18? On page 7 of the booklet, the Dry Gourd Requirement #2 says:"stems optional". Further down the page, a requirement dealing with Jim Story Classes says: "Gourd and Stem must be Green Cleaned"

Answer

Dry Gourd Requirement #2 says: Stems must be clean **if attached** - stems optional. This applies to ALL Dry Classes.....and to the Jim Story Classes 14-18. AGS Jim Story rules state: "Green Cleaned preferred but not required." (There is no mention of stems.) IGS rules are more defined for 2014: Gourd and Stem must be Green Cleaned...... This means that....**if** there is a stem attached, it MUST be Green Cleaned, as does the rest of the gourd. If there is NO stem attached, there is no stem to clean.

FYI as a Judge

I would place a Green Cleaned gourd with a Green Cleaned stem at a higher ranking than a Green Cleaned gourd without a stem. So for your Jim Story entry, the stem is optional, but try to keep the stem attached if you can, for a higher ranking. Be sure to Green Clean the gourd and the stem. — Pat Moore
