September and October are good times to spread the gourd word, and patch members have led craft sessions for senior citizen groups, including a 3-hour demonstration on October 5th at an annual Senior Expo that features music, clowning, and approximately 60 vendor booths (health, real estate, senior care facilities) interested in marketing to and serving seniors. Several folks are thinking about crafting gourds, and one lady decided she would get down the bag of 30 that are stashed in her attic. We are hoping a few decide to visit the Thorntown patches for fellowship and inspiration. Throughout September Denise Bechtold and Ardie Bowles had their art featured at the Sugar Creek Art Center. In October Sandra Townsend led patch members in creating pumpkin people, based on Phil Hart's May gourd show silent auction contribution. Members and visitors will work on individual projects as well. We shall cut more 4-inch quilt blocks as soon as we dig out enough gourds with flat areas. There are a few gourds on the trellis where they belong, as well as five about 30-feet up in an evergreen tree and one hanging in the Linden tree. #### From the Education Archives

#### **Drying And Harvesting Gourds**

Ornamental, soft-shelled gourds are ready to harvest when the tendril next to the gourd turns brown or the stems are dry and brown. Ornamentals are often picked prior to being fully mature and used for fall displays. If harvested early and not mature, these soft-shelled gourds may develop wrinkled skins and rot. When the gourds rattle [dry], you can paint or polish them with products used for finishing wood. Ornamental make excellent holiday ornaments or add interest to wreaths.

Hard-shell gourds require 110 to 150 days of warm weather to fully mature. They should be left on the vine as long as there is life in the vine. They must be cured. Since gourds are over 90% water, it may take several months for a large gourd to dehydrate. I wait till after hard frost in central Indiana to harvest my hard-shells.

Freezing temperatures do not hurt mature gourds. If the gourds wrinkle up, this indicates an immature gourd. One can leave gourds outside to dry or use an attic or garage. The outer skin will mold, rot, and began to peel as the gourd dries. **DO NOT THROW AWAY THE MOLDY GOURD**. After the fruit [gourd] has dried, scrape off the outer skin remaining to reveal the hard permanent shell below the grime. Soak dried gourds in water for a few minutes and wash/scrape. Use of a plastic scrubbing pad works for removing most of the mold. The mold patches may have discolored the shell but this can be painted over or use a clear finish to Enhance the appearance. Remember any wood finishing product can be used on a dried gourd.

#### **Green Cleaning Gourds**

THE PURPOSE OF GREEN CLEANING IS TO ATTAIN A FINISH OR SURFACE THAT IS MORE EVEN IN COLOR AND APPEARS CLEANER; USEFUL FOR MORE FINER CRAFTING DETAILS.

- (1) First of all, gourds must NOT BE HARVESTED until after a killing frost, when all the vines are brown and dead.
- (2) Clip stem at desired length and rinse gourds with hose to remove dust and bug spray.
- (3) Scrape or peel gourd with a whittling motion, completing entire gourd. This includes scraping the stem. A small wire brush is useful for finishing the base of the stem. The gourd skin is similar to cucumber peeling.
- (4) Scrub in light suds and warm water with steel scouring pad to remove minute particles. A small amount of bleach can be added to water, if desired, to help stop mildew.
- (5) Rinse and dry.
- (6) Place near low heat indoors, using plant flats or shallow cardboard boxes. These can be put above the duct work in the basement or along baseboard heaters. Gourds should be turned every day or two to insure uniform drying. Also, gourds can be hung up by the stem, using various methods. A fan will speed drying time, surrounding the gourd with constantly moving air.
- (7) Size of gourd determines drying time. In three weeks to two months, gourds will become very light in weight and seeds may or may not rattle.
- (8) Store in a dry place in open crates or hanging in potato bags.
- (9) Craft as you wish when thoroughly dried.

SOMETIMES, FAILURES DO OCCUR, OFTEN BECAUSE THE GOURD HADN'T MATURED AT THE TIME OF THE FROST. SOME MAY SHRIVEL DURING DRYING, AND THOUGH THIS MAY NOT BE THE DESIRED EFFECT, THEY STILL ARE IN DEMAND FOR FLOWER ARRANGING AND CREATIVE CRAFTING.
