President's Message

Hello! It's been over a year and a half of surviving the Covid-19 Virus and things, events are going on.

The Indiana State Fair was up and running this year, but with some changes. This year's Fair ran from July 30th – Sunday, August 22nd, with the Fair being closed weekly on Mondays and Tuesdays. At this year's IGS booth, we had volunteers to talk gourds with and do demos for visitors at the fair. It was nice to be talking gourds with others again.

The IGS membership meeting is on October 16, 2021 at the Thorntown Library from 10am to 4pm ET. Among other topics we will be discussing the 2022 State Gourd Show, "Down on the Farm" on May 6-7, 2022. Please keep checking the IGS and AGS websites for updates on these future shows and events.

It is getting near the end of gourd growing season, you should have vines and gourds growing everywhere. Indiana's "first frost date" is October 10, so don't get in a hurry to harvest those gourds. By mid-November the vines should be dying nicely and the gourds in the drying or rotting mode. To do a quick test, see the education article on the website "Gourd Maturity Test 101" (or reprinted here on page 7). This will help you determine if your gourds will most likely dry or rot.

Sugar Creek and Thorn Tree Gourd Patches (Karen Niemeyer, contact)

Both patches meet at the Thorntown Public Library, 124 N. Market St., Thorntown, and welcome new participants. Masks ARE NOW REQUIRED based on state COVID rulings. Social distancing is practiced. At all sessions participants are encouraged to BYOP: Bring Your Own Projects. In August, participants worked on "Down on the Farm" gourds with the intent of creating a gallery for the May 2022 IGS state show. Gourds exhibited at the July Boone County Open Show were displayed; Karen even displayed her gourd lamp begun a few years before when Delaina DeHaven taught a class for the groups. It won a blue ribbon, but the judge asked, "Why are not all the holes the same size?" Duh…because Karen was experimenting with drill bits.

It was truly a team effort to get 19 projects entered into the August Indiana State Fair and we thank Denise Bechtold for hauling in and picking up our entries. We'll plan to display these entries and discuss the results at our Sept. 1 (6-8 p.m.) and Sept. 15 (2-4:00 p.m.) meetings. Since a January display of gourd snowmen is planned for the library display case, snowmen will be displayed and planned for the September 1 and 15 and the October 6 and 20 meetings. Karen will demonstrate the hot shoe for transferring carbon-based patterns to gourds and it may be used during the sessions. We shall need to decide when we plan to make additional 4" gourd quilt squares and whether or not to begin another gourd quilt.

As always there will be spinner gourds to clean to be ready for future shows (or crafting at patch meetings) and Karen will have dried, cleaned gourds and supplies on hand for first-timers. Questions may be directed to Karen Niemeyer at the library (kniemeyer@thorntownpl.org) (765-436-7348).

Gourd Maturity Test 101

When harvesting your gourd crop in the fall, do this simple test to tell if a gourd is mature and will dry or rot over the winter. This test is good for both Hardshell and Ornamental Gourds.

Test:

Using your thumbnail somewhere near the bottom of gourd, try to push straight into the gourd. Now look at what happened.

Results:

1) If your nail CAN puncture the skin and meat of the gourd:

a) It is not mature and most likely will rot eventually.

b) But, you can probably use it for holiday decorations until it starts to rot.

2) If your nail CAN NOT puncture into the gourd shell or only scratchers the skin:

a) It is mature and mostly will dry over the winter.

b) Use the gourd for holiday decoration, and then let it dry outside, over winter. When dry you can clean and craft it.

FYI:

- If your thumbnail has punctured/scratched the skin, only....no big deal, it may become a blemish, or not.
- If your nail went into the meat of the gourd...the gourd is not mature. Poking it will not have caused any problems, it was not mature anyway, and most likely will not survive.
- Depending where you live, and how soon killing cold weather gets here, your nearly mature gourds might make it.
- 4. Do this test at end of growing season or mid-November.
- 5. Your thumbnail mark is like a bug bit to the gourd. One bite is not going to hurt/kill the gourd.
- 6. If the gourd is still growing, it is not mature.
- 7. By October, most gourds are as mature as they are going to be. A dry, brown stem is a good indicator that the gourd is mature. Best bet now is to wait and see what happens. Hope for a late freeze. When harvested, put on a pallet or something to hold the gourds off the ground outside, and see what happens to them.
